Singing and accompanying and/or playing with backing tracks. Playing with increased fluency. Final performance for parents/other class etc.
Improvise and compose music for a range of purposes using the inter-related dimensions of music.	Composition - e.g. composing a song.Improvisation .
Listen with attention to detail and recall sounds with increasing aural memory.	 Further development of listening skills. Further development of critical listening and evaluation skills.
